Values such as solidarity and mutual respect are also promoted in the game.



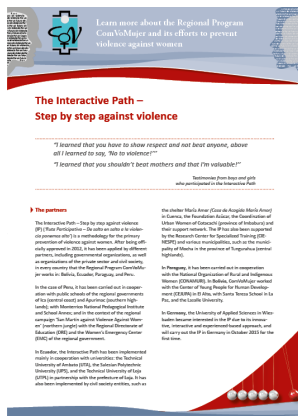

Step by step against violence. A participatory “path” to prevent gender-based violence

Background
For decades, violence against women has been considered a private matter which had to be resolved within the family. Today, however, there is a growing public concern. This change of perception is based on recognizing gender violence as a violation of human rights that also requires a society's role of structural development.
Consequently, policies and actions have responded. In particular, social gender-based violence prevention programmes have been developed and campaigns have been launched, along with projects in some states.
Evidence suggests that building the culture of gender-based violence requires the personal engagement starting at an early age. Initiatives are still in the process of increasing their reach and of promoting and understanding gender norms, such as between “gender” concepts with each gender and an awareness of an “equal opportunity of everything.” Because these norms are not readily incorporated, they are an ongoing work in progress.

Methodology
The age group of 6 to 9 years is chosen for its characteristics: it is a period of high receptivity and it is a period of high socialization. The “path” is designed to be a participatory process that involves the children in the construction of their own norms and values.
